Chairperson's Report

On behalf of the Board of Directors I submit a report for Members' consideration upon the activities of the Company during the last preceding financial year.

Financial Results

Dogs Queensland's funds have increased over budget by \$63,675.00. This surplus is due to total income exceeding the budget projection by \$44,952.00 (2%), and our total expenses were less than the projection by \$19,430.00 (1%). Our capital expenditure for the year was \$83,985.00, which had been budgeted at \$183,985.00. The reason for the \$100,000.00 shortfall, is due to the Durack toilet extensions now being scheduled to commence work in 2014.

I thank the General Manager and Mr Wayne Chapple for their personal contribution to maintenance of the budget throughout the year.

The Board of Directors rely heavily on the activities of a number of Committees and Working Parties to carry out responsibilities and ease the workload. To the Chairpersons and members of all our committees and Working Parties, I extend the very sincere thanks of both the Board and the membership.

Durack Chair - Ms C Pearen

During the course of the year you will have no doubt seen a few changes and additions around our Dog

Queensland Durack complex. There have been new Paths, Off leash areas, a new BBQ area plus the development of a Food Court and improvements to the Camping area. A vote of thanks for these achievements must go to the hard working Durack Committee.

Strategic Planning - Chair Mrs U Greenwood

Mr Howard Nielsen was 1 of 2 facilitators that presented to the Board and after a presentation he was successful. There are Strategic Planning Workshops scheduled to take place in 2014. Updates will be made by the Committee and Mr Nielsen to all members through the Dog World Magazine and the Dogs Queensland Website.

Conformation Judges Committee

- Chair Ms S Bendixen

The Conformation Judges Committee have worked on revamping the current training scheme, as well as the format regarding distance education and a structured critiquing process. Rule changes etc. were published in the September Dog World. This Board is continually looking at ways to improve the training system for all trainees. At the Seminar earlier in the year many trainees who attended gave a lot of positive feedback regarding the changes.

Canine Health Committee - Chair Dr G Perry

This Committee has been reviewing a code of practice for members and breeders, which was put together by Mark Sheppard and a small committee. This has been done and the Health committee are looking at progressing the documents before presenting the final draft to the Board, before it is put to the membership.

Library & Archives Committee

- Chair Mrs H Acworth

This committee have contributed monthly to the Dog World with magazine features and notations of books available in the library for your use. They have also been selling old books through stalls and the library to enable them to purchase more up to date and more informative books for our trainee judges. They are currently working with the Conformation Judges Committee to ensure that there will be information given to all trainees regarding what books are available for each group that they are attending.

Events Managers and Stewards Committee – Chair D Weil

Continued training of Show Managers, Stewards and Writers in all zones has taken place. The programme will be extended to include Trial Managers, Trial Secretaries and Trial Stewards if needed. The Committee have also put together the heat policy, for all Show Managers to implement when needed. This committee was one of the hardest working committees (the pink brigade..!!) at the first Dogs Queensland All Dog Sports Spectacular and deserve our vote of thanks for doing a great job.

Magazine, Public Relations and Marketing Committee – Chair Mr S Thomas

To date the Committee have implemented the first Dogs Queensland show bag for the EKKA, brought sponsorship in for Dogs Queensland including prizes of hydrobaths and a whelping system plus a three year sponsorship deal for Dogs Queensland with Royal Canin. They are currently working on the bags for this year's EKKA as well as sponsorship for the Agility National, DOY and our All Dog Sports Spectacular. This committee is owed a huge vote of thanks for its contribution to Dogs Queensland.

Amenities Committee – Chair Ms R Nicholson

Amenities Shows were held in Zone 2 and 3 with Zone 1 amenities to start in April this year. Due to the committees and some sponsorship both Zone 2 and 3 shows were a success. The running of shows, as most clubs know, is not always the easiest of tasks but the Amenities Committee, in the various zones have shown their commitment to succeed.

Junior Handlers – Chair Mr I Rasmussen

This committee has run regular training sessions at Durack and are now looking at ways for regular training to happen in Zone 2 and Zone 3. The Junior Handlers Final this year will be held at the Gundog and Heavy Breeds show at Durack in August, more information and updates will be published in the Dog World Magazine.

Dog of the Year Committee – Chair Mr T Thomas

The first DOY/POY final is now under this committee's belt. There were some positives and negatives taken away and considered very seriously by this committee. This was a great learning experience for all those involved, work and fundraising is well on the way for this year's Finals.

RAFT – Chair Ms D Rapson

This committee have had a year of training judges, holding trials, and co-ordinating input for the Retrieving Rule Review. Congratulations to this hard working committee for the organisation and the co-ordination of trials held in Bundaberg as well as other areas in Queensland.

OTARHED Committee – Chair Mrs B Murfet

This Committee covers Obedience, Tracking and Track & Search, Agility, Rally 'O', Herding, Endurance and Dances with Dogs. They have a branch of Subcommittees for the different disciplines. They have also been busy putting together rule review changes for the various disciplines, making sure that all members and judges are familiarised with any new rule or procedure. The Obedience and Dances with Dogs Subcommittees have applied for and been granted a National Event in 2015. The Agility Subcommittee are having their National in 2014 and are hard at work raising funds and sponsors for the big event. The Endurance Subcommittee are looking for judges to train in this discipline. Many of these disciplines also took part at the Dogs Queensland All Dog Sports Spectacular and have our vote of thanks for their great contribution.

Into the Future

Dogs Queensland will be holding another All Dog Sports Spectacular on the 24th of August. After the knowledge that was gained from last year's trial we believe it will be very well publicised and participated in by a bigger and wider audience. We will be marketing and publicising Dogs Queensland starting from January 2014. This will be a huge year for Dogs Queensland with the involvement of the members in the Strategic Planning meetings. This will only ensure a bright future for our Dog World.

PRIMARY REPORTS

The last 12 months has again seen significant gains and an escalation in the status of Dogs Queensland with State and Local Governments. I would remind members once again that I do rely on their feedback regarding upcoming reviews of local laws. The process to change Local laws is a very time consuming and costly one – the best time for Dogs Queensland to present our Breeder Permit strategy is at a time that coincides with a Local Government review of their laws.

Members will recall that in the early part of 2012 there was a real focus on what was at the time described as the Bligh Government “Puppy Farm” strategy. The concept was to “register” every breeder in Queensland and to have the activities of those breeders “tracked” by the RSPCA in an attempt to identify so called Puppy Farmers. This Puppy Farm strategy was not resurrected by the new Agriculture Minister John McVeigh during 2013 but this may well change if and when the NSW Government makes a decision on Legislation in that State. There is no doubt that State Governments do watch each other and at times play “follow the leader”.

We monitor as closely as possible the activities of welfare groups both here in Queensland and Interstate.

All other State and Territory Controlling Bodies also need to confront the Puppy Farm strategy in their home states. Dogs Queensland have been able to provide some very valuable strategic information to assist those Controlling Bodies deal with their State Governments. A considerable amount of time was allocated to assisting our NSW counterparts deal with proposed Puppy Farm type legislation in that State with a very professional and well considered submission being made to their Government decision makers – we now have to wait to see whether the submission is successful.

Presentations to Queensland based Local Government bodies is ongoing in respect of our Breeder Permit strategy. I do hope that 2014 will see more Local Governments adopt our permit scheme – it provides considerable benefits to our members as well as Local Government Animal Management officers.

It would be remiss if I didn't take an opportunity to thank General Manager Rob Harrison and his office team for their support during the last 12 months. I do look forward to working very closely with our elected Board of Directors during 2014 and beyond – there are some very exciting initiatives on the agenda all of which are designed to further enhance our standing with all of the “outside” entities that would seek to impact our Dog World in Queensland. Member support as always will ensure the success of these initiatives.

The company was registered as a company limited by guarantee on 10 September 2012, having previously operated as an unincorporated association.

The principal activities of the company during the year were the registration and promotion of pure bred dogs.

No significant change in the nature of those activities occurred during the year.

KEY PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The company measures its own performance through the use of both quantitative and qualitative benchmarks. The benchmarks are used by the directors to assess the financial sustainability of the company and whether the company's short-term and long-term objectives are being achieved. The Key Performance Measures used are Renewing Full Single Members (3,570), Full Joint Members (1,312), New Members (792), Litter Registrations (14,064), Renewing Prefixes (3,168), New Prefixes (363) and Transfers of Dogs (3,393).

MEMBER'S GUARANTEE

Canine Control Council (Queensland) Limited is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of, and for the purpose of winding up of the company, the amount capable of being called up from each member and any person or association who ceased to be a member in the period prior to the winding up, is limited to \$1. The number of Members at the end of 2013 was 6,737, (2013 - \$6,737).

OPERATING RESULTS

The profit of the company for the financial year amounted to \$163,675.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

No matter or circumstance has arisen since the end of the financial year, which has significantly affected or may significantly affect:

- (a) the Company's operations,
- (b) the result of those operations,
- (c) the Company's state of affairs.

DIVIDENDS

The company is prohibited under its constitution from payment of dividends to its members.

INDEMNIFICATION OF COMPANY OFFICERS AND AUDITORS

During the financial year, the company paid a premium in respect of a contract insuring the directors of the company (as named above), the company secretary and all executive officers of the company and of any related body corporate against liability incurred as such a director, company secretary or executive officer to the extent permitted by the Corporations Law.

The company has not otherwise, during or since the end of the financial year, indemnified or agreed to indemnify an officer or auditor of the company or of any related body corporate against a liability incurred as such an officer or auditor.

DIRECTORS' BENEFITS

Within the financial year, no director of the company has received or become entitled to receive any benefit by reason of a contract made by the company or a related corporation with the director or with a firm of which he is a member or with a company in which he has a substantial financial interest.

OBJECTIVES:

The objectives of the Company shall be:

- (1) to be the governing canine body for the State;
- (2) to maintain membership of the National Canine Body and to enhance and promote its standing within that body;
- (3) to promote and encourage the development and responsible breeding of healthy purebred registered dogs throughout the State;
- (4) to promote and encourage the recreation, sport, exhibition and training of the CCC(Q) Ltd registered dogs throughout the State
- (5) to promote and encourage the training of all dogs throughout the State;
- (6) to promote the development and improvement of the health and welfare of purebred registered dogs throughout the State;
- (7) to promote and encourage membership of the CCC(Q) Ltd with its attendant advantages and privileges;
- (8) to promote and develop policies and regulations that shall be used as a quality benchmark for dog breed standards ensuring that the welfare and health of dogs remains paramount;
- (9) to promote, develop and maintain close working relationships with all levels of Government (Commonwealth, State and Local) to ensure the best

interests of members and the registered dogs of the CCC(Q) Ltd are protected and enhanced;

(10) to promote, develop and maintain close working relationships with other organisational bodies and other stakeholder groups with similar objectives to ensure the best interests of members and the registered dogs of the CCC(Q) Ltd are protected and enhanced;

(11) to promote and encourage public interest and participation in the CCC(Q) Ltd sanctioned exhibitions and events;

(12) to promote and encourage scientific research into canine related health issues both in Queensland and interstate;

(13) to act as the control of the CCC(Q) Ltd registered dog related activities throughout Queensland including:

- (i) to administer Rules for the conduct and regulation of all the CCC(Q) Ltd exhibitions and events;
- (ii) to keep a register of purebred dogs and their ownership;
- (iii) to keep a register of all breeder prefixes;
- (iv) to administer regulations relating to purebred dogs;
- (v) to grant or withhold affiliation to bodies with similar objectives referred to as affiliated bodies;
- (vi) to administer certificates, awards, championships and titles;
- (vii) to assist in the prevention of illegal or dishonest practices in relation to dog related activities in Queensland; and
- (viii) to facilitate the operation of independent registers for Non-Conformation activities including registers for non-purebred dogs;

(14) to promote and encourage development of knowledge and skills relating to canine activities.

To achieve these objectives, the entity has adopted the following strategies:

Attract and retain qualified staff to administer the business of the entity and provide member services which meet consistent standards of best practice as compared to similar entities and this is evidenced by low staff turnover

Attract and retain volunteers from within the membership who are committed to the entity's objectives

Both staff and volunteers will continue to work towards both the entity's short and long term objectives

Continue to keep open the lines of communication with all Government bodies on all aspects of purebred dogs

Collect, verify and publish information relating to purebred dogs and the breeding and exhibition of purebred dogs

Keep and maintain a canine register of purebred dogs

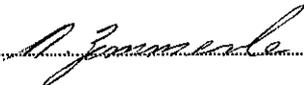
Promote the holding of exhibitions and to conduct exhibitions

The Conformation Judges Committee has reviewed and updated our current training scheme, bringing it more in line with the ANKC guidelines whilst taking into consideration the size of the State and the issues this causes in trying to ensure that the trainees in remote areas receive satisfactory training.

We have introduced a more structured format with regard to Distance Education. This will ensure that all distance education candidates are following the same guidelines no matter where they are situated.

All trainees that do not attend the lectures held at Durack are required to study by Distance Education.

Regional Facilitators were appointed in each country zone and they are responsible for the candidates in their area. They organise field days to enable candidates to have the opportunity of assessing dogs whilst under their guidance.

The Regional Facilitators also organise Sweepstakes days in their area to allow candidates to judge the number of dogs required for elevation. This is in addition to the usual Open Shows which the local clubs conduct.

To assist the trainees in obtaining more experience, and better equip them for both their Practical examination and critiquing when judging overseas, we have introduced a more structured critiquing process into the Judges Training Guidelines.

All candidates will now be required to attend three Specialty Shows along with either the Group Coordinator or an Accredited Assessor and critique five dogs at each show. It is hoped that attending

Championship Breed shows will give trainees a better insight into those breeds and have the added benefits of being mentored by an experienced judge and the opportunity of watching breed specialists judge their respective breeds.

The Committee appointed three of the current trainees as Liaison people. This has been very successful and they have provided valuable feedback from the Trainee Judges.

Thank you Jodie, Sharon and Tim.

A successful seminar was held in July where the rule changes were explained to Trainees and they then had the opportunity to update their handling and ringcraft knowledge.

Our thanks go to Aileen Goller for organising a seminar on Rare Breeds. Booklets from this Seminar are still available.

We will continue to organise more Seminars for the Trainee Judges, to assist them with their education and to make them more competent judges.

We plan to conduct an "Accreditation Seminar" for Championship Judges early in 2014. This will ensure they are compliant when assessing at "hands on" examinations held under the ANKC guidelines.

Trainee judges enjoyed the opportunity of judging at the "Open Show Spectacular", which was held on the same day as the DOY competition. Committee member Carolyn Pearen deserves a huge thank you for the planning of this event and the wonderful trophies that were provided.

My sincere thanks must go to the members of this Committee who have contributed so much time and interest in providing successful outcomes for our Trainees. We welcome feedback from trainees and will continue to be progressive.

The Canine Health Committee and the Breeders Accreditation Committee have existed for a number

of years. This year it was decided that, due to the considerable overlap in their responsibilities, the two would be amalgamated. Its composition is of animal health professionals (4 veterinarians and 1 veterinary nurse), a breeder and 2 Board representatives.

The Committee has met three times - one of the first decisions was to draft a mission statement and the following was adopted:

In 2013 the EMSC achieved many positive outcomes as given below.

Training for stewards, writers, show managers and show secretaries was successfully undertaken in Brisbane (Durack), Maryborough, Mackay, Mt Isa and Rockhampton. This was the first year of providing training for Show Secretaries and was received well by those who attended across the State.

Zone 1 delivered 3 training weekends with 36 attending Stewards and Writer's training, 10 attending Show Secretary's training and 1 for Show Manager's training.

Zone 2 provided 3 weekends of training with 31 in attendance for Stewards and Writer's training, 7 for Show Secretary's and 13 for Show Manager's training.

Zone 3 had one training weekend with 8 attending Stewards and Writer's training and 7 for Show Manager's training. Unfortunately a further Zone 3 weekend in Cairns was cancelled.

The training weekends provided opportunities for some people to attend as a refresher course, whilst others successfully gained first-time accreditation as Stewards, Writers and Show Managers.

- Confirmation of CCC(Q) Ltd Income Tax and Capital Gains Tax exemption status.
- Special Resolution – Clarity regarding President, Senior Vice President and Junior Vice President positions.

The Board of Directors hereby gives notice of a Special Resolution

(a Special Resolution is a resolution needed to be passed by at least seventy five percent [75%] of members present at a General Meeting) to amend the CCC(Q) Ltd Constitution in accordance with Clause 70 of that Constitution reproduced below;

70 Amendments to the Constitution

70.1 Subject to the Act, this Constitution may be amended only if:

- (1) a Special Resolution is passed at a General Meeting that a proposed constitutional amendment be put to members for a vote; and
- (2) seventy five percent (75%) of all members who vote, vote in favour of the proposed amendment at a subsequent ballot. Clarity regarding President, Senior Vice President and Junior Vice President Positions

1. Clause 2.1(2)

Insert the words "unless a contrary intention appears," at the beginning of clause 2.1(2).

2. Clause 2.1(5)

Insert the following definitions as they should appear alphabetically:

"Junior Vice President" Any Director appointed to perform the duties of Junior Vice President of the Company in accordance with clause 28 and any Director appointed to act temporarily as Junior Vice President.

"President" Any Director appointed to perform the duties of President of the Company in accordance with clause 28 and any Director appointed to act temporarily as President.

"Senior Vice President" Any Director appointed to perform the duties of Senior Vice President of the Company in accordance with clause 28 and any Director appointed to act temporarily as Senior Vice President.

3. Clause 28

Delete clause 28 and replace as follows:

"28 Election of the President, Senior Vice President and Junior Vice President

28.1 In addition to such officers as may be appointed under clause 25.1, the officeholders of the Company shall include:

- (1) One (1) President;
- (2) One (1) Senior Vice President; and
- (3) One (1) Junior Vice President.

28.2 At the first meeting of the Board of Directors following the Election under clause 27.2 the Board of Directors shall elect a President, Senior Vice President and Junior Vice President from amongst the Board, to hold office until the first AGM. In determining the division of Board responsibilities, the Board is to ensure coverage of all of the disciplines of the CCCQ Ltd.

28.3 Immediately after the first AGM the Board of Directors will elect a President, Senior Vice President and Junior Vice President from amongst the Board to hold office for a period of two (2) years.

28.4 The Board of Directors will elect a President, Senior Vice President and Junior Vice President from amongst the Board to hold office for a period of two (2) years in the relevant election year at the first meeting of the Board of Directors following the AGM in that year.

28.5 The President and the Senior Vice President shall be referred to as the Chairperson and the Deputy Chairperson of the Board of Directors respectively."

4. Clause 34.2A

Insert clause 34.2A as follows:

"34.2A If a casual vacancy occurs in offices of President, Senior Vice President or Junior Vice President, the continuing members of the Board of Directors may appoint another member of the Board of Directors to the position of President, Senior Vice President or Junior Vice President, as the case may be."

5. Clause 34.3

Insert the words "or a Director holding the position of President, Senior Vice President or Junior Vice President, as the case may be" at the end of the first line of clause 34.3.

6. Clause 34.3(3)

Replace clause 34.3(3) as follows:

"(3) resigns or retires from the Board of Directors or the position of President, Senior Vice President or Junior Vice President, as the case may be;"

7. Clause 36.10

Amend clause 36.10 so that the word "Senior" is inserted before the words "Vice-President" in the two instances in which it occurs.

8. Clause 46

Delete clauses 46.2 and 46.3 as these are no longer required (i.e. the President serves as Chairperson of the Board and the Senior Vice President serves in his or her absence).

9. Clause 52.3(2)

Replace the word "Vice-President" with "Senior Vice President".

10. Clause 69.6

Replace "Vice President" with "Senior Vice President, Junior Vice President".

· Any other item of business submitted in writing by a member to the Secretary not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date fixed for the AGM.

In accordance with Clause 48.1(5) of the CCC(Q) Ltd Constitution, Members are asked to submit any additional items of business to the CCC(Q) Ltd Office no later than 11 March 2014.

Note 1: All Financial Members are entitled to attend the AGM, vote at the AGM and submit Items of Business for the AGM. Any renewing Members from 2013 who are yet to pay their 2014 Renewal Fees may only attend the AGM but may not vote at the AGM unless their 2014 Renewal Fees are paid prior to the AGM.

NOTE 1 THE COMPANY

The Canine Control Council (Queensland) Ltd is an incorporated company limited by guarantee.

NOTE 2 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. The company is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards. Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

The financial statements except for the cashflow information has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified where applicable by the measurement of fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied. The amounts provided in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised in the year it is earned. Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues. Other revenue includes income from committees of the company, affiliated organisations, donations and sponsorship and is recognised on an accrual basis. All revenue is stated at the net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(b) Unearned Revenue - Note 12

Includes Membership, Affiliation, Advertising and other fees paid to the company. These fees are initially recognised as unearned revenue and are progressively recognised as income over the period to which they relate. The unearned portion of these fees at 31 December is included in the account unearned revenue.

(c) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is non assessable for tax under the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment..

(d) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition or as part of an item of expense.

Receivables and payables are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included in the Statement of Financial Position. Cash flows are included in the Statement of Cash Flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

(e) Receivables - Note 7

Certain trade debtors' accounts specify a specific due date and those accounts are payable on that date. Other debtors which have no specific due date for payment are normally settled within 30 days. The collectability of debts is assessed at balance date and provision is made for any doubtful accounts.

(f) Investments - Note 8

Bank short term deposits (*current assets*)

The bank bills are shown at cost. Interest is accrued at the contracted rate and included in "other debtors".

(g) Inventories - Note 9

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Items which are considered consumables are expensed in the year of purchase. Inventories are primarily printing material sold to breeders, members and club organisations.

(h) Property, plant and equipment - Note 10

Acquisition

Items of property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost.

Depreciation and amortisation

Items of property, plant and equipment including buildings and ground improvements are depreciated using the diminishing-value method and prime cost method over their estimated useful lives.

The depreciation rates used for each class of asset are as follows:

Durack

- Buildings and ground improvements 2 - 20%
- Plant and equipment 5 - 50%

Office

- Building 2%
- Plant and equipment 10 - 100%
- Refurbishments 20%

Assets are first depreciated or amortised in the year of acquisition and the asset complete and ready for use.



NOTE 2 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Recoverable amount

The carrying amounts of non-current assets valued on the cost basis are reviewed to determine whether they are in excess of their recoverable amount at balance date. If the carrying amount of a non-current asset exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is written down to the lower amount. The write down is expensed in the reporting period in which it occurs. In assessing recoverable amounts the relevant cash flows have not been discounted to their present value.

(i) Payables – Note 11

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in the future for goods or services received, whether or not billed to the Company. Trade accounts payable are normally settled within 30 days.

(j) Employee entitlements – Note 11

The provisions for employee entitlements to wages, salaries and annual leave represent the amount which the Company has a present obligation to pay resulting from employees' services provided up to the balance date. The provisions have been calculated at amounts based on current wage and salary rates.

(k) Long service leave – Note 12

Provision with respect to long service leave is made on the basis of the total nominal entitlement of permanent employees from 5 years after commencement of employment. The provision has been calculated at amounts based on current wage and salary rates. The Board is satisfied that this estimate reliably represents the present value of future cash flows to be made by the Company in respect to services provided by employees up to the reporting date.

(l) Superannuation plans

The Company contributes to several specific superannuation plans. Contributions are charged to the income statement as incurred. Further information is set out in Note 16.

(m) Financial Instruments Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted)

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest method, or cost. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments and any reduction for impairment, and adjusted for any cumulative amortisation of the difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts

estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying amount with a consequential recognition of an income or expense item in profit or loss.

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments. Valuation techniques are applied to determine the fair value for all unlisted securities, including recent arm's length transactions, reference to similar instruments and option pricing models.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets are classified at "fair value through profit or loss" when they are either held for trading for the purpose of short-term profit taking, derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying amount being included in profit or loss.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

(iii) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the company's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset has been impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets will be deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of the occurrence of one or more events (a "loss event"), which has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset(s).

In the case of financial assets carried at amortised cost, loss events may include: indications that the debtors, or a group of debtors, are experiencing significant financial difficulty, default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; indications that they will enter into bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; and changes in arrears or economic conditions that correlate with defaults.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost (including loans and receivables), a separate allowance account is used to reduce the carrying amount of financial assets impaired by credit losses. After having undertaken all possible measures of recovery, if the management establishes that the carrying amount cannot be recovered by any means, at that point the written-off amounts are charged to the allowance account or the carrying amount of impaired financial assets is reduced directly if

no impairment amount was previously recognised in the allowance accounts.

When the terms of financial assets that would otherwise have been past due or impaired have been renegotiated, the company recognises the impairment for such financial assets by taking into account the original terms as if the terms have not been renegotiated so that the loss events that have occurred are duly considered.

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expire or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability, which is extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(n) Comparative Figures

As it is the first year of operation for the company comparatives have not been presented for the previous financial year.

(o) New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued new, revised and amended standards and interpretations that have Mandatory application dates for future reporting periods, which the company has not adopted early.

The application of those standards to the company has been reviewed and it has been assessed that they will not have any material impact to the company's financial statements.

The company does not anticipate early adoption of any of the reporting requirements included in these standards and does not expect these requirements to have any material effect on the company's financial statements.
